What's Your Motivation for Becoming a Nurse Leader?

I became a nurse leader to lead change and advocate. Often there are people making decisions for nurses that are not "doing" the work. Being a leader requires one to have the professional courage to speak up in difficult times and not be afraid to lead through difficult times. The most rewarding part of being a nurse leader is motivating other nurses to speak up and advocate for their patients and advocate for what they need to care for patients.

The hindrance becomes an issue when organizations do not realize diversity is what makes their organization better. Instead of just being in the room, we need more seats at the table to really make bold changes.

As a child, I was always fascinated by Harriet Tubman and how she was able to free so many slaves. Even with a bounty on her head, she kept going! Her story is captivating. She was such a strong woman that refused to give up, and not to mention she was also a nurse. Her strong will and determination made a way for so many to escape to freedom. When I read her story over and over in school, I would always imagine being a woman that strong. Therefore, I do not believe in giving up when I think about how Mrs. Tubman put her life on the line for others. I feel it is my obligation to keep moving forward and give it my all.
