Punxsutawney Phil saw his shadow last week – predicting 6 more weeks of winter – and the long-range forecast suggests he might have gotten it right this year! But as resilient as our TriHealth team has been over the past year, I cannot imagine a few more weeks of winter slowing us down. Spring will definitely be here before we know it and so will the end of this once in a century pandemic!!

COVID Status Update

There is continued good news regarding the spread of COVID. Hospitalizations in the region and at TriHealth continue to gradually decrease, as regional hospitalizations dropped below 500 last week with just 99 inpatients at TriHealth on Monday. It's been months since we've seen numbers this low and it's encouraging to see this downward trend. Sadly, though, in January we saw the highest number of COVID related deaths as a nation since the pandemic began nearly a year ago. And as we continue to monitor the new variants being discovered across the country, there is hope that the vaccines, coupled with continued use of masks and other mitigation measures, will be able to blunt their impact. So, it remains as important as ever for all of us – even if vaccinated – to continue practicing our COVID Always Behaviors (listed in the sidebar) until all of our loved ones and community members can receive their vaccine.

COVID-19 Weekly Update

- 99 COVID-positive patients in TriHealth hospitals with 12 on ventilators in the ICU.
- 13.5% COVID positivity rate overall, with a 19.4% positivity rate for symptomatic patients tested at TriHealth over past two weeks. Target positivity rate is under 5%!

Vaccination Status Update

Community vaccinations continue and this week those over the age of 65 are eligible for the vaccination process. With teachers newly eligible for vaccinations this week, our allotment for the public will be even lower than it's been in recent weeks at about 1,000 doses. With the governor's focus on essential healthcare workers, teachers and the most vulnerable populations – coupled with the tight supply of vaccines – it is likely we won't start vaccinating the general public younger than age 65 until March or perhaps later, depending on when additional vaccines like Johnson and Johnson's single dose are approved for use. Even with broader community roll out of vaccines still weeks away, it remains vitally important for us as healthcare workers to educate people on why it is important to get the vaccine when it becomes more broadly available.

The Black and Brown communities we serve have tragically been disproportionately impacted by COVID infections and death. And today, there remain lingering questions and a reluctance to be vaccinated within these communities of color – for understandable reasons related to history and a lack of trust. Dr. Bill Buckley and our Diversity, Equity and Inclusion team recently shared with me this video of Dr. Anthony Fauci discussing the importance of educating communities who may be reluctant to get the vaccine with prominent Bishop T.D. Jakes. TriHealth is continuing our own targeted education campaigns with Dr. Paul Waller's participation on a live panel during the Local 12 noon news last week and Dr. Angel Mena's recent interview on La Mega

97.7FM, a local Spanish-language radio station. Throughout this pandemic, TriHealth has been a credible source of reliable and trusted information, and it is our mission to serve our entire community, particularly those who traditionally have been underserved.

The Bose Game Package winners were also surprised with a very personal pre-game Zoom meet and greet with Bengals quarterback Joe Burrow! Overall, the NFL invited 7,500 vaccinated healthcare workers to the Super Bowl to recognize the heroic work performed each and every day by caregivers such as ours. The PSA will continue to air on Local 12 for the next couple of months as part of TriHealth's multi-faceted community education campaign aimed at answering questions and allaying fears about the vaccine – all in order to achieve herd immunity and eradicate this virus and pandemic once and for all!

Finally, February has traditionally been Heart Month, and we don't want the important messages of "healthy heart care" lost in all the COVID news cycle. As we've discussed repeatedly over the past year, far too many members of our community have delayed seeking preventive or even emergency care due to fears related to COVID and this pandemic – and it is often having devastating effects on the severity of patients' conditions when we finally see them.
