 negatively impacted by having appointments canceled.
- Last year a physician needed to return home to Alabama quickly due to a family emergency.
 Flight options were not working. Wendy was concerned about this physician making this drive herself in her emotional state, so she and another co-worker literally got in the car and made the 18-20 hour drive to deliver her "home safely."
- When another team member had a personal health crisis, Wendy provided the family support she needed when there was no other family local to help.
- When a physician's spouse had a health crisis and was admitted, Wendy stayed with this physician for hours until the physician's own children could arrive.

The list goes on and on. These are just some of the ones I can think of that have happened in the last 12-18 months.

Wendy spends hundreds of dollars a year of her personal money doing thoughtful things for her staff. Special badge clips, hot potato bar, hot chocolate bar, smores bar, scarves, pins, special order cookies,



lunch, and hand cremes. The list is long. Her total focus is to make each and every team member know they are seen, valued and matter.
