Sadly, we've seen another week of steady increases in COVID cases and hospitalizations throughout the state and here at TriHealth - mirroring national trends (see latest COVID stats in sidebar to right). Last week, the region's health systems joined with

the Health Collaborative for a press conference to speak with one voice in urging the public to do everything possible to comply with proven mitigation measures – including masking, social distancing, and not gathering – to slow the spread and prevent the need for a more drastic, mandated response. Dr. Helen Koselka, Good Samaritan Region CMO, represented TriHealth and spoke about our readiness to respond to future surges and the importance of community members adhering to the common-sense mitigation measures. TriHealth Prepared to "Stay Open" Through Next Wave of COVID Journey. With the worrisome spike in COVID cases and seemingly daily media reports projecting future "worst case" scenarios, it's understandable that concerns are high regarding hospital capacity and the potential for another round of mandated shutdowns and furloughs. I want to reassure you that TriHealth has been working with the region's other health systems almost non-stop since

March to prepare for the reality we are now facing. We are ready to address this next COVID wave and do not anticipate another state-imposed shutdown in elective procedures or new furloughs. In fact, we expect, and have been preparing for, an even greater need for full staff capacity than ever before!

While it's likely we will continue to see a rise in cases and hospitalizations through the fall and winter, TriHealth's surge plans are designed to assure we are well-equipped to safely care for an influx of COVID-positive patients, as well as ALL other patients requiring elective and emergency care. We have spent the last seven months building our stocks of PPE (more than 900 days of N95 masks!), hiring and onboarding new clinical staff, improving throughput and patient flow, operationalizing additional inpatient beds, putting in place contingency surge plans, and collaborating with local health systems to be ready for this moment. So we remain confident that we will be ready and available for anyone who needs our services in the community, no matter what! To do so, we will need every single team member, physician, and leader to help us manage through this next phase of our COVID journey. Staffing, in many ways, will be more important for "staying open" than physical beds, facilities or technology. So our plea is to stay safe, take care of yourself, and be vigilant in adhering to our COVID Always Behaviors - TriHealth and Your Community Need You!!

I also want you to know that we will continue to make open, honest, real-time communications our top priority through this next phase of our COVID journey. If there is a change in our operations status, you will be the FIRST TO KNOW. And if necessary, we will quickly increase the frequency of our livestreamed leadership and team member/physician Town Halls – which we held weekly during the first COVID wave and now hold monthly – to ensure our team stays informed and up to date on COVID news.
